

Audience Manifesto



Welcome to the Audience Manifesto, created for the Royal Exchange Theatre over two years by 2,150 audience members.

Over this period we have been developing You, The Audiencea giant conversation with theatre audiences, designed to help us to rethink our ideas of 'audience' - who they are, as individuals and as a community, how we engage and collaborate and how this might be key to influencing the future of the Royal Exchange. You, the Audience is about us listening and learning and, as we learn, it's about us growing and changing.

We've collected audience stories, listened to what audiences feel theatre is for, and created Theatre Cafe, a conversation group led by the public. 100 audience members aged 9 to 73 took part in a sleep over in the theatre, and 2,150 individuals have created this Audience Manifesto.

As the next step, we will be inviting audiences- at least 50% of whom will not have engaged with the exhange before-to work with us to develop our response to this manifesto, challeng us, if you like, to fulfil our passionate drive to be a theatre that is genuinely socially engaged, inclusive, connected, and in meaningful exchange with the people of Greater Manchester.




I want a theatre where absolutely everyone feels welcome

I want theatre to demonstrate more ethnic diversity on and off the stage









I want theatre to be a place for children






I want theatre to know it belongs to the public and to reflect this in everything it does






I want a theatre that understands theatre can happen anywhere and should happen everywhere

I want theatre to connect more with ordinary people




I want theatre to speak for people whose voices wouldn't be heard otherwise




I want theatre to be demanding and entertaining at the same time
